As a leading voice for Arkansas business, the State Chamber/AIA strives to promote policies that support employers, encourage innovation, and ensure Arkansas remains competitive in a rapidly evolving economy.

Today's economic landscape demands fierce competition—for every job, every investment, and every opportunity. To thrive, Arkansas must align its strategies, adopt innovative ideas, and focus on measurable progress to build a stronger, more prosperous future.

Representing more than 1,100 businesses of all sizes and sectors, the State Chamber/ AIA collaborates with local chambers of commerce, business associations, and economic developers statewide. Our primary priorities include:

- **Developing a skilled and available workforce** to create a robust talent pipeline for Arkansas employers.
- Advocating for a competitive tax environment that attracts businesses and investments.
- Fostering an economic environment that positions Arkansas as a leader in attracting and retaining businesses.
- Securing long-term funding for infrastructure to support sustainable economic growth.

This agenda is developed with input from our issue-based committees and approved by our boards of directors. It serves as a roadmap for our legislative efforts and guides our governmental affairs team. The State Chamber/AIA Executive Committee provides direction for critical issues, conflicts of business interests, or emerging challenges.

This agenda serves as the foundation for our legislative scoring. The results will be featured in the 2025 Legislative Summary to demonstrate our advocacy outcomes.

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OUR MISSION

Taxation

TIER 1

Tier 1 represents high-priority issues that the State Chamber/AIA seeks to address immediately to drive impactful changes for Arkansas businesses.

WE SUPPORT

- ⊘ Immediately updating state sales tax rules and ensuring compliance with required biennial rulemaking after each legislative session.
- Sestablishing an income tax credit for property taxes paid on inventory and eliminating the inventory tax.
- ⊘ Improving access to affordable childcare.
- Seviewing legislative proposals to amend Tax Appeal Commission laws with the intent to support changes that benefit Arkansas businesses.
- Solution Modifying sales tax nexus requirements to ensure out-of-state sellers charge sales tax on Arkansas internet purchases.

WE OPPOSE

8 Eliminating local advertising and promotion taxes that support community growth.

TIER 2

Tier 2 includes longer-term objectives that the State Chamber/AIA will pursue responsibly as additional opportunities or fiscal resources become available.

- \oslash Lowering income taxes for individuals and corporations in a fiscally responsible manner.
- Sextending the Net Operating Loss Carry Forward period.
- S Fully repealing the throwback rule.
- \odot Implementing market-based sourcing to align Arkansas with other states.
- \otimes Allowing the depreciation and exemption of rural broadband grants.
- \odot Increasing the equity investment credit from 33% to 50%.
- Ø Adjusting technical Pass Through Entity (PTE) tax policy adjustments.
- Sexpanding the manufacturing tax exemption to cover custom manufacturing.
- Sensuring equal access to economic development tax credits for nonresident investors.
- ✓ Converting the reduced rate for manufacturing electricity and natural gas into a true exemption and expanding qualifying fuels to include coal and lignite.
- 𝔅 Clarifying tax exemptions on water purchases for manufacturing use.

Workforce Quality and Education

WE SUPPORT

- 𝔅 Improving literacy and numeracy among Arkansas students.
 - Prioritizing immediate Reading Readiness for all Pre-K-12 students, with exceptions for those precluded by intellectual disabilities.
- Solution Developing, retaining, expanding, and attracting a globally competitive workforce.
- Sentancing technical education and workforce training programs to ensure statewide accessibility for all students.
- © Developing a continuous learning system with student-specific, competency-based portfolios to provide clear pathways through K-12 education, career technical education, higher education, and incumbent workforce.
- \otimes Advancing efforts to help public schools improve academic outcomes.
- Sexpanding alternatives to traditional K-12 and post-secondary education by providing students with clear information on alternative pathways and facilitating seamless transitions from high school apprenticeships or internships to college certificates or apprenticeship programs.
- Solution Investing in CTE initiatives and enhancing funding for modern training equipment to better prepare students with essential skills.
- ${}^{\oslash}$ Expanding the Adult Diploma Program to provide Arkansans with more flexible educational opportunities.

Adopting four-day school weeks in Arkansas schools.

- Sensuring the availability, capacity, and affordability of electricity.
- \bigotimes Safeguarding oil and gas production in Arkansas.

Healthcare

WE SUPPORT

- \odot Maintaining a Medicaid Expansion Plan to preserve federal matching funds.
- Services for employers without increasing costs for employers or employees.

WE OPPOSE

8 Healthcare mandates that increase the cost of employers' healthcare plans.

Economic Development

WE SUPPORT

- Adopting the Arkansas Economic Development Commission's legislative package as endorsed by the Arkansas Economic Developers & Chamber Executives.
- Solution Addressing housing shortages to promote economic growth.
- ✓ Expanding access to childcare to support employees' families and improve workforce retention.

Labor & Employment

WE SUPPORT

- Protecting employers from large and obstructive protests that prevent employees and customers from accessing businesses.
- S Improving the affordability and accessibility of childcare for Arkansas workers.

WE OPPOSE

- 8 Repealing, reversing, or limiting the Arkansas Right-to-Work law in any way.
- Repealing noncompete clauses.

Transportation and Infrastructure

WE SUPPORT

- Serviding the Arkansas Department of Transportation with sufficient revenue to maintain safe highways.
- Preserving and enhancing transportation and infrastructure development through all other forms of government provisions.
- Sexpanding and developing rural broadband access.

Legal Environment

WE SUPPORT

- ✓ Modifying the attribution of fault among tortfeasors.
- ✓ Adjusting recoverable damages in personal injury cases.
- ✓ Protecting employers who hire ex-offenders.

WE OPPOSE

8 Allowing third-party lawsuit financing.

Unemployment Insurance

WE SUPPORT

- Sexpanding workforce access for individuals leaving incarceration, potentially exempting them from first-year unemployment insurance contributions.
- Solution Adopting guidelines to help employers identify employees working under the influence of marijuana.

WE OPPOSE

8 Indexing the minimum and maximum weekly benefit amounts and the duration of benefits.

Occupational Licensing

WE SUPPORT

Seducing unnecessary licensing and regulatory requirements.

WE OPPOSE

Eliminating all licensing requirements.

Workers' Compensation

WE SUPPORT

- S Amending or eliminating the Made Whole Doctrine.
- ✓ Adopting a Major Cause rule for cases where an injured worker has a pre-existing condition.

WE OPPOSE

- Set Efforts to increase or eliminate benefit caps.
- S Changes to civil procedure rules that would erode or eliminate exclusive remedy protections.
- Sexpanding compensation to cover mental injuries without a corresponding physical injury.

Census

WE SUPPORT

 ${}^{\oslash}$ Securing appropriations to fund initiatives aimed at achieving a complete and accurate census count in 2030.

Taxation

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

WE SUPPORT

- S Maintaining Arkansas' three-pronged tax system of property, income, and sales taxes.
- ✓ Making the state's total business tax burden competitive with neighboring states and with other states in the region and maintaining the state's tax competitiveness long-term.
- 𝔅 Retaining current legal requirements for passing new taxes.

WE OPPOSE

- Shifting the tax burden to businesses and industries, thereby making Arkansas less competitive for investments and jobs.
- 8 Eroding the tax base in any way that does not promote economic development.

SALES & USE TAX

WE SUPPORT

- Sestablishing a data center or business computer equipment exemption.
- ✓ Creating a warehousing and distribution exemption.
- Sexpanding manufacturing equipment exemptions to include all facility equipment.
- Sexempting consumables used in manufacturing.
- \odot Extending deadlines for local sales and use tax refunds.
- 𝔅 Centralizing the administration and enforcement of sales and use taxes.

WE OPPOSE

- Imposing double taxation or "pyramiding" on business inputs.
- Imposing new taxes on business services.
- Shifting tax responsibility from property or income taxes to business-to-business sales taxes, including software downloads.

- \odot Providing preferential tax treatment for capital gains.
- \oslash Adopting the Model Uniform Statute for reporting federal adjustments to taxable income and partnership audits.

WE OPPOSE

- Adopting any sales factor throwout rules.

- ⊗ Eliminating capital gains exemptions.

PROPERTY TAXES

WE SUPPORT

- Sexpanding the freeport exemption to include distribution centers for out-of-state products.
- Sensuring fair property assessment and valuation procedures.

BUSINESS INCENTIVES

WE SUPPORT

- Senacting Arkansas Economic Development Commission's competitive incentive package.

- 𝔅 Creating or enhancing incentives to attract knowledge workers.
- \bigotimes Reducing, capping, or eliminating the franchise tax.

TAXPAYER RIGHTS

- Ø Protecting and expanding taxpayer rights in assessment and collection processes.
- \bigotimes Protecting the confidentiality of taxpayer information and data.
- \oslash Reducing overpayment and underpayment interest rates to 5% or a comparable, less distortive rate.



Education and Workforce Quality

- Series Promoting core values in Pre-K-12 public education, including student focus, transparency, accountability, rewards, choice, and agility.
- ✓ Linking Career Technical Education funding to programs that meet market demand (e.g., high-wage industry needs) and achieve student outcomes (e.g., employment or program completion) with a five-year plan for phasing out and discontinuing funding for ineffective programs.
- 𝔅 Advocating for data-driven alignment and improved quality across Pre-K, K-12, and higher education.
- ${}^{\oslash}$ Encouraging student-focused business leaders to run for and be elected to local school boards.
- Sempowering technical education instructors and adjunct faculty to work across multiple institutions within the industries of their expertise and receive salaries competitive with private employment.
- Sequiring schools that cover the cost of AP tests to also fund, at the same frequency and from the same source, the cost of national technical credential examinations for enrolled students.
- Collaborating with organizations such as Arkansas Learns, Arkansas Public School Resource Center, Upskill Arkansas, Economics Arkansas, STEM Coalition, Forward Arkansas, and Arkansas AIMS to advance studentfocused priorities.
- \odot Expanding the impact of the "Be Pro Be Proud" initiative.
- Solution Advocating for efforts to grow and improve Arkansas' workforce by:
 - Search Raising career awareness among parents, students, educators, and policymakers to highlight diverse career opportunities.
 - Sensuring that career counselors provide detailed information on job prospects, including salary data and intrinsic benefits.
 - \bigotimes Increasing flexibility in education programs to meet evolving market needs.
 - Sexpanding access to work-based learning opportunities.
 - \bigotimes Engaging disconnected youth in workforce preparation.
 - 𝔅 Preparing more ex-offenders for employment while providing protections for businesses that hire them.
 - Structuring workforce training around industry sector strategies.
 - \oslash Prioritizing talent development and retention through work-based learning experiences.
 - \otimes Using data for continuous improvement and accountability in workforce programs.
- Series Encouraging local chambers and economic developers to collaborate with community leaders and educational institutions to identify and support workforce needs, such as basic reading, math, and soft skills, and to create partnerships that align training programs with employer requirements.
